Pekapeka-tou-roa is the te reo Māori name for the NZ long-tailed bat. Not many native animals in Aotearoa have teeth, but bats are one of them!

Pekapeka and their whānau have two sets of teeth like us. They have baby teeth first, and then adult teeth! They need to look after their teeth because they help them to eat and to burrow.
